Faith for the New Year

We begin a New Year with faith in the meaning of life, and in the validity of striving to make a better world. We are encouraged in our endeavor by the realization of accomplishments during the year that has passed.



The year 2012 was, in many ways, a year to encourage hope for the future of First Friends. We began an intensive study of the Meeting's finances, with discussions about steps to be taken to secure ongoing financial health. Becky Overmyer-Velazquez and daughters Amara and Zoe

were lovingly welcomed as new members. We participated in many Whittier-area community projects, including the Interfaith Council's Cold Weather Shelter, a Whittier Community Work Day, and the Interfaith Community Thanksgiving celebration.

In April our Deanna Woirhaye (pictured) represented us at the 6th World Conference of Friends in Kenya as a

delegate from the Western Association of the Religious Society of Friends (WARSF). In July, Jasmine Sturr participated in the Quaker Youth Pilgrimage organized by Friends World Committee for Consultation, visiting sites in England, Brussels, and the Netherlands important in the history and contemporary



work of Friends. Both of these Friends have enriched our congregation with reports on their experience.

Whittier Friends School is undergoing resurgence.

For the first time, intermediate level classes (grades 7 and 8) are being offered. Seven well-adjusted Intermediate students completed the fall semester and are progressing well in their learning program. The Elementary School gained two new students from the Preschool, and the latter now has a healthy enrollment of thirteen. The sell-out benefit event on December 1, which brought 160 paid attenders into Fellowship Hall to see the winter play, "A Charlie Brown Christmas," and to enjoy the annual Chili Cook-Off, testified to the considerable outreach of the school into the Whittier community.

Hubert Perry, our member for all of his nearly 100

years, was honored by the City of Whittier when it named him Grand Marshall of the 2012 Uptown Christmas Parade. Hubert has been active in so many cultural and civic enterprises that he has acquired the title of "Mr. Whittier."



Many of our members continue to be active in the wider world of

Quakerism as board and committee members of the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC), Earlham College, Friends Committee on National Legislation (FCNL), Friends United Meeting (FUM), and Friends World Committee for Consultation (FWCC). Our ties to Whittier College are maintained by teaching scholars serving Whittier Friends School, music scholars singing in our Worship Choir, and worship messages and forums brought by faculty members.

On February 2-3 we will be visited by a delegation from the Earlham School of Religion. On the following weekend, Feb.8-9, we will send delegates to Berkeley Friends Church to participate in the annual meeting of WARSF, an umbrella organization founded by members of this Meeting. We also look forward to March 2nd when Colin Saxton, Executive Secretary of FUM, will present our 2013 Quaker Forum.

Charlie Brown Learns Meaning Of Christmas

More than 150 Whittier Friends School parents, staff and guests enjoyed the school's winter program and Chili Cook-Off fundraiser the evening of December 1 in Fellowship Hall. Seventh-grader John Karr played the title role in "A Charlie Brown Christmas." He and all of the other intermediate and elementary students turned in fine performances in the classic play based on "Peanuts."

The Intermediate students showed the poise and maturity that they have acquired together over several years as classmates. The characters created by cartoonist Charles Schultz were immediately recognizable to "Peanuts" fans. Linus, with his ubiquitous security blanket, was faithfully portrayed by Katerina Ryder. Anathea Woirhaye as Lucy, Cedric Woirhaye as Red, and narrators James Tucker, Bryan Thornhill and Avon Dhawal were authentic in their roles.

Elementary students rounded out the cast of well-loved characters: Ashley Ryder as Sally, Matthew Horbino as Schroeder, Elyse Woirhaye as Peppermint Patty, Mikhayla Hays as Frieda, and, of course, Snoopy (Jayden Vance-Velez) and Woodstock (Matthew Quesada), dressed in charming canine and avian costumes, respectively, designed by Marie Kaneko. The younger confectioners, both experienced from previous years, were in continuous motion, efficiently carrying out their assignments with only an occasional request for instruction from coach Lynda. Ingredients were mixed "by instinct," as exact measurement would have further challenged the small work force. Most recipes called for hand-mixing with a large spoon. Only the Martha Washington Mounds, a delectable confection premiered this year, required a power stirrer. Fortunately, Lynda was given a new electric mixer as a Christmas present to replace the one that burned out on "Oreo Truffles" at last year's candy session.

When this reporter left the scene, this admirable band of candy crafters showed evidence of determination to complete their assignment. And so they did. Their products were packaged by a larger work force the following Sunday morning and placed on sale at the Christmas Dinner that evening. The candy sale brought in \$771, half to be donated to the Interfaith Food Center.

Marilyn Fant Sings Solo From The Messiah

Liturgical Advent Music Provides Unusual Worship

The "Great 'O' Antiphons" originated as Advent chants of praise written by Gregorian monks of the 7th and 8th centuries. The antiphons were continued in the Anglican liturgy and later became part of the Christmastime devotional music of Lutheran and then Presbyterian churches. On Sunday, December 2, the antiphons finally found their way into a Quaker Meeting. Music Director Russ Litchfield gave First Friends a new worship experience, complete with a Gregorian Advent message sung by members of the choir.

The seven "O" Antiphons, so-called because their titles begin with the Latin form of address "O," are traditionally sung at evening services during the week preceding Christmas. The antiphon text is taken mostly from the book of Isaiah, foretelling the coming of Christ. Each antiphon session includes the Magnificat, or Song of Mary, from the Gospel of Luke: "My soul magnifies the Lord."

Five of the seven "O" Antiphons were presented by the choir, standing in a circle and directed in front by Russ, who joined in some of the singing. The text of the first antiphon, "O Sapientia" (O Wisdom) is taken from Ecclesiastes: "O Wisdom, proceeding from the mouth of the Most High, pervading and permeating all creation, mightily ordering all things. Come and teach us the way of prudence."

Singing of this and each of the other antiphons was followed by Scripture readings by members of the choir, and a short prayer by Russ. Marilyn Fant read the Scripture pertaining to the first antiphon, Diane Wemmerus the second (O Root of Jesse), Allison Coop the third (O Dayspring), Mark Juaton the fourth (O King of the Nations) and Chris Jones the final (O Emmanuel) antiphon. Marilyn returned to read Luke's "Song of Mary" poem before the choir sang the concluding Magnificat, with solo parts by Kathryn Schuman.

The congregation then joined the singing of the familiar Advent hymn "O come, O come Emmanuel" to conclude an unusual and moving Christmastime worship experience.

Remembering Jack McFerran

Former member Jack Walter McFerran died in Whittier on September 13, 2012. Jack and his wife Mary joined First Friends Church in 1975 during his third career—as a stockbroker. Crippled by polio after graduating from South High School in Denver, CO, in 1945, Jack used his manually-operated automobile as a drive-up office for his elderly, homebound Whittier clients. Parked in front of a client's home, he would call them on his mobile phone to have them join him in his car for their appointment.

Jack's first career, following his graduation from UCLA with a degree in mathematics in 1949, was as an accountant for the city of Denver. Not satisfied after several promotions, Jack embarked on his second career by enrolling in the Church Divinity School of the Pacific in Berkeley, CA. He was ordained as a deacon in the Episcopal Church in 1955. Following ordination as a priest, he served the Episcopal Church of Reincarnation in Norwalk, CA. While he enjoyed working with his congregants, he made his final career change in 1964, returning to the world of numbers as a stockbroker. He worked his way up in management for several brokerage firms, but in 1977 devoted full time to client accounts, which he continued until he retired.

Jack married Mary Chilton in 1964, and they had two daughters, Kathryn and Janet, who in turn presented them with three grandchildren and one greatgrandson. Jack and Mary were early and strong supporters of the Long Beach Aquarium. He was a Rotarian with nearly 50 years of perfect attendance, and an avid fan of Anaheim's Mighty Ducks.

Jack completed his spiritual journey as a Roman Catholic. His funeral mass was conducted on October 11th at St. Bruno's church by his fellow Rotarian and long time friend, Father Jim Bradley. — Rob Settlage

These last few weeks we've spent a lot of time with John the Baptist. John quotes the prophet Isaiah when he says: "Prepare the way of the Lord." Of course it got me thinking, always a dangerous thing. How are we preparing for the Lord? Do we plan our lives in preparation for

As the week continues, begin to prepare heart and mind for worship. Allow some time for daily quiet times. There are wonderful devotional materials available; take some time to read one of them. Pray for our worship services. Pray for inspiration for me, Lynda, and for Russ. Pray for openness to the Holy Spirit.

The pastor in our membership class reminded us to prepare for worship, by planning our week around it. Plan Saturdays so there will be energy left to worship God. Get clothes ready. Have children prepare their clothes. Set a time to get up and a time to leave so that you can be on time. Funny how these are things that we do on a daily basis for school, work, and appointments, but instead of setting aside our best for God, we sometimes offer our least. I wonder how often we walk out of Worship disappointed by the service when we've done nothing to prepare ourselves.

Quaker worship was designed to be participatory. I've read numerous accounts of the daily worship of Quaker families. As an attender and as a pastor, I know that the deepest leadings come after spending quality time with God during the week.

So with these thoughts in mind I ask you: How are you preparing for worship? Is worshipping God your daily and weekly priority?
