Light! Commitment! Solar!

At Monthly Meeting on January 7, years of research and Quaker threshing culminated in the approval of a solar power system for the entire property, including the Meeting House, Fellowship Hall, the Sharpless Building and the Christian Education Building. At the same time, lighting in the meeting house will be upgraded to energy-efficient LEDs.

Funding for the project will be provided by the fund designated by the Meeting exclusively for capital improvements.

Listen to the sounds around us, observe with your eyes, feel it with your hands and skin, deeper with your heart and soul, inhale and smell, let the taste linger on your tongue; a subtle but discernable shifting. Walk around. Sit still. Be in solitude. Be in community. There is a pause, pregnant with possibilities. It is change Spirit-brought, waiting to unfold before us. It can lead us to "see God more clearly, love God more dearly, follow more nearly," if we just let it. We can call it scary, or we can call it exciting. They are two ways of looking at the same journey.

Something has come to our attention in a new way. Finances. Some might call it a problem. Others call it one of the many signs in the transformation we are experiencing and can choose to be an active part in. Will we resist, or find a way to immerse ourselves in the flow of the Spirit? Can we examine and let go of our dependence upon what has been and things of the world, and instead seek things of the Spirit, in the now and where we are to go in the future?

We can do the work to balance our budget. We can think outside the box and do smart financing. We can shift resources, cut costs, reduce old programs, invest and expand growth initiatives, hire younger staff and start new programs to attract people. We can convert fixed capital to liquid cash, develop new rental opportunities, and sell. We can down-size and rightsize and fund-raise and donate. We can figure and calculate, make tough choices and smart decisions. We could even make no decisions, do nothing, rely on what resources "The Meeting" can come up with, and that too, would be making a choice. Or we could eliminate the box altogether and open ourselves together to the Spirit.

Get rid of the box?! All the notions of what our meeting and a church is, who we have been, where we have done ministry before? What would that look like? It would not start with spreadsheets, stewardship calls, fundraisers, program development, and financial brainstorming. Instead, prayer, open worship, communion in the manner of Friends, deep listening to the Spirit of God for insight and direction and leading. In every moment; alone and together with Friends, in every gathering and new gatherings specific to the queries: "Who are we called by God to be?" "What gifts is God calling us to nurture,

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will be reduced by an estimated \$1,500 each month.

The decision to move forward with the project exemplifies the Meeting's leadings to use primarily sustainable resources and to reduce our carbon footprint. It is also informed by our prayerful mission to craft a sustainable budget now and in the future, and to provide a visible witness of stewardship to the community.

The Meeting has hired the Los Angeles-based Sunistics Group for the design, installation and ongoing service of the system. Installation is expected to begin in late spring in time for the summer heat.

Michael Knight, the senior partner of Sunistics, attended Monthly Meeting and was both impressed and reassured by the depth of questions Friends had for him concerning this major capital project.

We look forward to following the progress of our solar power system along with further exploration of this new expression of our responsibility to God's world.

Last month, Whittier Friends School elementary students had fun with gourds provided by Ted and Mary Marshburn, which were part of the beautiful harvest display in the Meeting House during November. They also had to problem-solve to determine a way to measure the curved gourd when their ruler was straight. They decided to use a string to hold against the gourd, and then measured the string. Most children were right in their hypothesis about the straight gourd being longer. It was a fun, hands-on project which showed the children, ranging in ages from 4 years old to 10 years old, that math is necessary for daily life, while depending on teamwork.
