#### Loletta's Lines

"Never doubt a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world. Indeed, it's the only thing that ever has." This quote motivates me, but two Quaker quotes contextualize and expand it.



Rufus M. Jones wrote, "I pin my hopes to quiet processes and small circles in which vital and transforming events take place." Lloyd Lee Wilson wrote, "The Religious Society of Friends... is at heart a corporate spiritual journey. It is not a place where each individual gets to have their own self-designed spiritual growth charter. It is only in our joint practice... experience, and... testimonies that we have communities... who can do the work that God has set us out to do. God's project... is the transformation of all creation."

We are a small circle; our Meeting, and all Friends together. But the first Quakers, and Jesus and his disciples (12 or 70) made up radical minority circles who stood aside from society, religious power, and government. Size doesn't matter (at 5' 2" I affirm small AND mighty). One small person, circle or group can accomplish a lot. Yet we must be transformed before we can transform the world. First comes love for God, self-awareness, and connection to others.

At our May Monthly Meeting, we practiced "threshing." The word is unfamiliar outside of agricultural setting and outside Quaker tradition. Threshing may be interpreted to seek to remove the chaff (personal prejudice, preconceived notions, lack of awareness, knowledge or understanding, or general bullheadedness) from the grain (God's Truth), and allow everyone to say what they hear from the Spirit without the burden of making a decision. Going deeper, threshing can remove us from "the world." (i.e. things that prevent or inhibit our focus on God.)

When threshing, we open to "receive the vocal ministry of others in a tender and creative spirit. We reach for the meaning deep within it, recognizing that even if it is not God's word for you, it may be so for others." Friends don't find unity through compromise, negotiation, or finding consensus but in listening for a leading, and abiding in God's Spirit.

This tradition of listening and abiding in the Spirit seeking unity is what I have found makes Friends unique. Practicing it in our small group transforms us; individually and as a Meeting, and it can transform the world.



## Blessed Babes and the Black Hole

The last two All Friends Fellowship Night events featured gripping personal stories by powerful speakers. On April 11, Tamera Rodriguez-Smith told of her heart-rending experience of years of domestic violence from her former husband. Somehow she found the courage to raise and educate her two children in the midst of a turbulent home situation her son and daughter now have successful careers. Tamera herself found the inspiration to launch her own anti-abuse counseling service, "Blessed Babes." Her training as a registered nurse and her experience on governing boards of agencies engaged in aiding abused women prepared her well for her new career project. Her personal story to Friends was well-timed with respect to our participation in the annual 5K Walk to benefit the Women's and Children's Crisis Shelter. Our own Marilyn Fant organizes this event every year for the Shelter's Right Hand, the principal support organization of the Crisis Shelter. Many Friends from

our meeting turned out for the 22nd annual Walk on April 21 in Uptown Whittier.

On May 8, Wes Murray, a life-long Whittier resident and amateur historian, told of his days as a navigator on board a B-52 aircraft, the U.S.'s first line of defense against attack during the Cold War years. His program title, "Flight from the Black Hole," whimsically referred to the dark, cramped space in the belly of the 8-engine super-bomber that he shared with another crew member. Wes and his crew flew more than 170 missions, each of which lasted 24 hours or longer, an excruciating experience that he learned to live with. His nuclear-bomber aircraft would routinely fly towards the North Pole and be on instant call to veer over the Pole to bomb the Soviet Union if so ordered. After leaving the Air Force, Wes embarked on a successful career as a landscape architect.

As this reporter browsed through the booths at the annual Founder's Day Fair in Central Park three days after Wes' appearance, I recognized Wes Murray demonstrating an amazing hobby-craft. He makes adorable wood-block toy vehicles of all kinds. On behalf of First Friends, I thanked Wes for his interesting presentation at All Friends Fellowship Night.

In his address to the board proceeding their deliberations and choice to call him as General Secretary, Kelly said that as a child of missionaries and a third-culture kid, he finds it difficult to say exactly where he is from. FUM, however, has become his spiritual home: "the place and the people where I belong."
