Love Thy Neighbor

In Galatians 5:14, Paul states, "For the whole law is fulfilled in one word, even in this: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself'". This was the focus for World Quaker Day on Sunday, October 5. First Friends commemorated the day in Meeting for Worship with messages from three Friends, recognition of our newest members, and a group picture.

Darrell Warren posed the question: "What does it mean to ponder your path?" He pointed out there are many words to describe the routes we travel, each with its own nuance. A path implies walking a track laid down by continual treading, yet we can wander off the path to and notice the details of our explore surroundings. When we head to a particular destination on the freeway, we are focused on arriving at the destination as efficiently as possible. And that's OK, but sometimes we are taken in unexpected directions as well. He encouraged us to notice, embrace, and appreciate the detours and diversions on our life's path as unexpected blessings and sacred enrichment.

Elisabeth Elliot began with a reference to 2 Corinthians 11:19 ("For ye suffer fools gladly, seeing ye yourselves are wise") in which Paul chides the Corinthians for valuing worldly wisdom and prestige rather than true spiritual



service and sacrifice. She pointed out that we cannot truly serve others if we think of them as "fools." She encouraged us to let go of the difficult interactions, honor the diversity in others, and give others the benefit of grace. She reminds us that God always gives us grace, and grace is the first step to loving our neighbor.

Mel Sturr reflected that loving your neighbor doesn't necessarily come easily or naturally; it is aspirational and starts with noticing how we speak, act, and react. He credits learning the power of empathy from examples of Friends he has known throughout his life in the meeting. He was also influenced by his mother, who dedicated her life to peace after experiencing




First Friends Selected for 2025 Clergy Renewal Program Grant

We are excited to announce our meeting has been chosen to participate in the 2025 National Clergy Renewal Program. We are one of 233 congregations across the United States selected for this competitive grant program, funded by Lilly Endowment Inc. administered by Christian Theological Seminary in Indianapolis. Established by the Endowment in 2000, the program's grants allow Christian congregations to support their pastors with the gift of extended time away ministerial from their duties and responsibilities.

Ministers whose congregations are awarded the grants use their time away from the demands of daily ministry to pursue renewal and revitalization. The approach respects the "Sabbath time" concept, offering ministers a carefully considered respite that may include travel, study, rest, prayer, immersive arts, and cultural experiences.

Through the National Clergy Renewal Program, congregations apply for grants of up to \$60,000 to support renewal programs. Collaborative in nature and implementation, the program allows congregations to partner with their ministers in developing experiences that address their unique renewal needs and aspirations. Congregational needs during the minister's renewal experience also considered. Up to \$20,000 of the grant may be used to support interim pastoral leadership during the pastor's retreat, as well as renewal activities within the congregation.

Since the inception of the National Clergy Renewal Program and the Clergy Renewal Program for Indiana Congregations, more than 4,526 congregations throughout the United States and in Puerto Rico have participated in the program, including the 233 congregations



receiving grants in 2025. Congregations in the 2025 programs represent the broad spectrum of Christian traditions, including Roman Orthodox parishes Catholic and and 28 congregations from **Protestant** denominations. In harmony with the spirit of these programs, congregations and their pastors collaborated to craft plans designed to renew pastors physically and spiritually and energize them in their ministry.

"We certainly owe the success of our application to the wonderful video of Friends speaking about why they are part of our meeting," said Pastor Loletta Barrett. She plans to use the grant during her three-month sabbatical in Spring/Summer 2026 to explore family history in England, Scotland, Wales, and perhaps Ireland. She also plans to rest and rejuvenate at a residential library in Wales ("a library with food and a bed sounds heavenly!"). In addition, she plans to spend time at Pendle Hill Retreat Center in Philadelphia, as well as at home with her feline companions, Zest and Joy. She also very excited about congregational portion of the grant. The meeting will be able to have an all-church retreat in fall 2026 and have funds to cover some of her pastoral duties as well.

2026 Stewardship Message from Business and Finance Committee

Dear Friends,

God has blessed us with many gifts, and we all give a combination of these - Time, Talent, and Treasure - to our Meeting. It is that time of year when we begin to create our budget for the following year. Support of our staff, upkeep of our facility for the use of the community, outreach, and Significant Giving - all of these are our collective responsibility and opportunity to help fund.

One of our priorities is Significant Giving. This is a portion of our budget we set aside to help with special projects or events in our community and abroad. Any member can bring an issue to the attention of Monthly Meeting for consideration. Recently, we have helped the Orange Grove meeting in Pasadena in the aftermath of the Altadena fire in their community and sent aid to Gaza through the American Friends Service Committee and the UN. We have helped people in war-torn Ukraine, supported the Friends Lugulu Mission Hospital in Kenya, and sponsored a water tank for a Navajo family bringing them running water. We have funded field missions for Friends United Meeting, and the list goes on.

Our significant giving has scaled back in recent years as our plans for support have decreased, but the demands have not. On October 12th, the Monthly Meeting asked for an aspirational increase of \$2,000 in the significant giving allocation for next year. If everyone could give just \$2.50 more per week, or \$10 more per month, we could meet that goal.

Most of our members, attenders, and supporting Friends send us money via check or billpay, but we have many options available. A new electronic payment option, Zelle, has been introduced! Unlike Paypal, Zelle has no transaction costs and can usually be set up on



a scheduled basis by your bank or sent on-demand from your smartphone.

First Friends Church requests that you prayerfully create a plan for financial support in 2026. This is not a hard and fast commitment, as we know that life changes. Sometimes we are blessed with resources we can share with the Meeting, and other times we are strained and have to share less. We do need to get our best estimate of what individuals can give, however, so that we can put together our budget for next year. We will have physical cards available that you can fill out, or you can fill it out electronically at https://forms.gle/FzwCiLhTwP9rYC7FA - or snap the QR code shown here. We ask that everyone fill out a plan for support by Thanksgiving, so we can bring a budget for approval in December.

Lastly, we invite everyone to a luncheon on November 9th, after Meeting for Worship – our treat from Business and Finance. Stay for Monthly Meeting if you like, but it isn't required.

October AFFN Features "Hams"

you Did know that amateur enthusiasts are affectionately known "hams?" Or that "73" is how operators express "best wishes" at the end of a transmission? Attendees at the October All Friends Fellowship Night learned these interesting facts and more. Following an abundant potluck dinner, Darrell Warren, Rita Barakat, Randy Pastrone, and Sylvia Graber-Pastrone shared their knowledge and experiences with ham radio.

Darrel noted that he has been fascinated by radios since childhood, and his father was a ham. He expressed his belief in the benefit of processing what we hear without images because it stimulates our ability to imagine. His first ham radio transmission was as a teen in 1982 to a contact in Japan with only 5 watts of power. Since then he has communicated with operators from all 50 states via Morse Code and has talked to people in places as far away as Sweden, Bulgaria, Papua New Guinea, Australia, and Cape Verde Island off the coast of Africa. His oldest contact was a 99-year-old gentleman, and his youngest was 10 years old.

Rita met Darrell when she was a graduate student at USC where she served with their Young Scientists Program. This program partners with elementary schools to encourage youth to consider future careers in science, technology, engineering, arts, and math (STEAM). She was tasked with writing a grant to enable the students contact International Space Station (ISS) by radio. That led her to take a class to obtain her entry level radio operator license (Technician Level) from the FCC. The grant was awarded, and after months of preparation and coordination with the school and community, the students were able to ask questions of the astronauts in space via live radio. Darrell was the licensed operator that day, and he shared with us a video of the students asking their carefully prepared questions.



Sylvia became interested in amateur radio after watching emergency preparation videos on YouTube. She noted that, in the event of widespread disruption of landline, cellular, and internet services, radio is a vital form of communication. For example, during 9/11, hams relayed information between emergency services, hospitals, and shelters, filled gaps in communications, official and helped coordinate volunteers for organizations like the Red Cross.

Her interest led her to take a class to obtain her General Class certification which provides access to all VHF and UHF bands for local and North American Communication and limited privileges on some HF bands for international communication. Her husband, Randy, studied the course online at the same time. They were able to take the 35-question test on the same day and were awarded consecutive FCC call signs.

Darrell emphasized that beyond being a hobby or even a vital service, amateur radio creates community and promotes peace. He maintains email contacts with operators worldwide, and once visited a fellow ham in unannounced, Zacateca. Mexico. and received a warm welcome and generous hospitality. If you want to learn more about this fascinating topic, The Rio Hondo Amateur Radio Club meets the second Monday of the month at the Whittier Senior Center at 7 pm, and all are invited. Or simply talk to one of our "ham" Friends.

Be sure to join us for the next AFFN on Nov. 12, when guest speakers from the Audubon Society will talk about Sycamore Canyon.
